The Museum of Cambridge is looking to appoint an experienced socially engaged practitioner with experience in co-curation as part of the *Legacies of Windrush in Cambridgeshire* project. Funded by Arts Council England and Cambridge City Council and working in partnership with the African Caribbean Research Group, this project seeks to celebrate and showcase the histories of the Windrush generation through a co-curated exhibition.

This project is looking explore, celebrate and share the richness of the Caribbean and Windrush communities in Cambridgeshire. Oral histories, collected from community Elders will safeguard the histories that are at risk of disappearing, while working with young people to co-curate an exhibition will enable more people to hear these important stories.

We are particularly keen to hear from creatives from Caribbean diaspora communities, who will bring lived experience of the Windrush generation.

Scope:



The Exhibition and Community Coordinator will develop and run workshops to support young people to reflect, learn about and develop ideas for an exhibition based on of the legacies of the Windrush experience in Cambridgeshire. These workshops will draw on the oral histories recorded by the project with Windrush Elders, objects donated by community members, as well as the Museum's collection.

Workshops will enable participants to identify objects, stories and themes to be presented in an exhibition. Reflecting on oral history content, as well as the Museum's collection and new objects donated by the communities the young people will be enabled to share their experience of being descendants of the Windrush generation and reflect on the legacy of the Windrush experience today.

ECC and the Project Officer will support the young people and Elders with the development of appropriate digital legacy of the project's findings to be display on the Museum's website(s), <u>www.museumofcambridge.org.uk</u> or <u>www.capturingcambridge.org.uk</u>

This creative will:

- Develop a series of structured workshops to enable young people to define, reflect and respond to the Windrush experience in Cambridgeshire as heard through collected oral histories, donated objects and the Museum's collection, as well as their own experiences of the legacies of Windrush.
- Create an open atmosphere where young people are able to share their reflections and experiences openly and creatively.
- Work with the Engagement Officer to develop public family activities on the topic of Windrush.
- As part of the workshops series, with the Project Officer, facilitate co-curation workshops, leading to an major exhibition from March-September 2025.
- Work with the Project Officer, a freelance graphic designer and community partner to shape to the exhibition and digital legacy outputs.
- Attend exhibition opening and relevant programming events.

Deliverables:

Facilitate a minimum of 4 workshops with young people to ideate and reflect on the legacy of the Windrush generation using oral histories and Museum collection.

Facilitate a minimum of two co-curation specific workshops.

Facilitate one evaluation workshop after the exhibition.
